

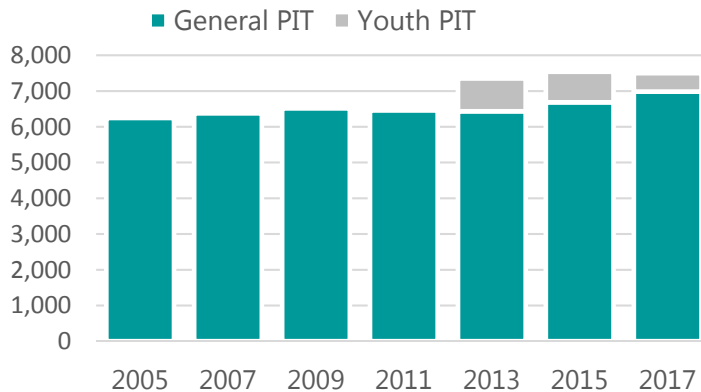

## Homeless Point in Time Count

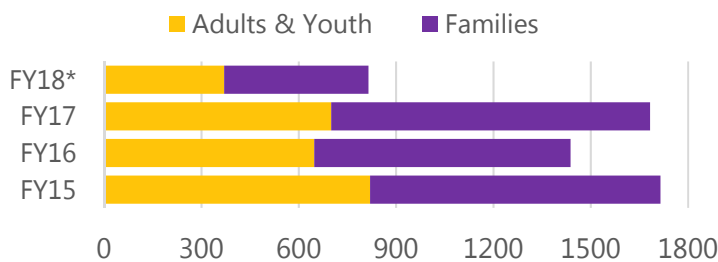
In 2013, San Francisco introduced a supplemental point in time (PIT) youth count.



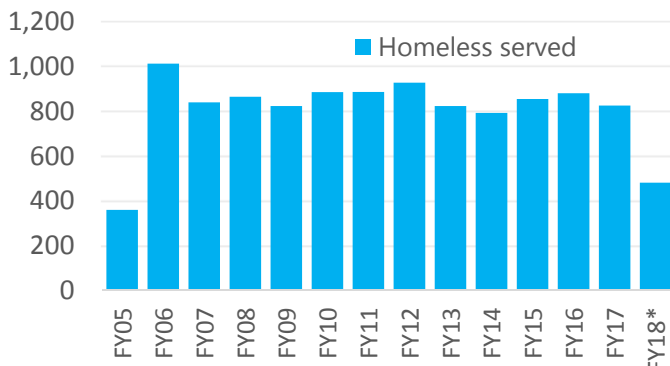
**2017 City Survey**

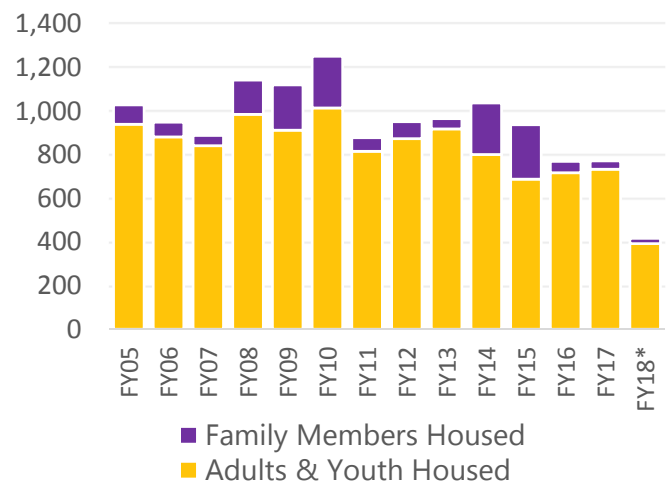

Placements in permanent supportive housing

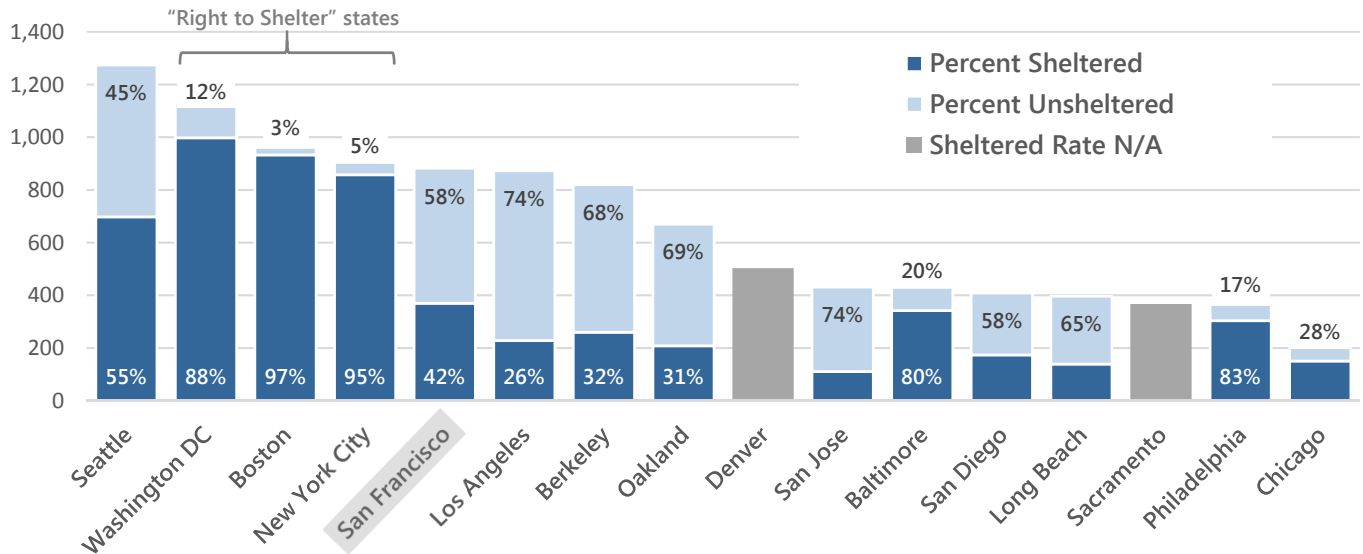

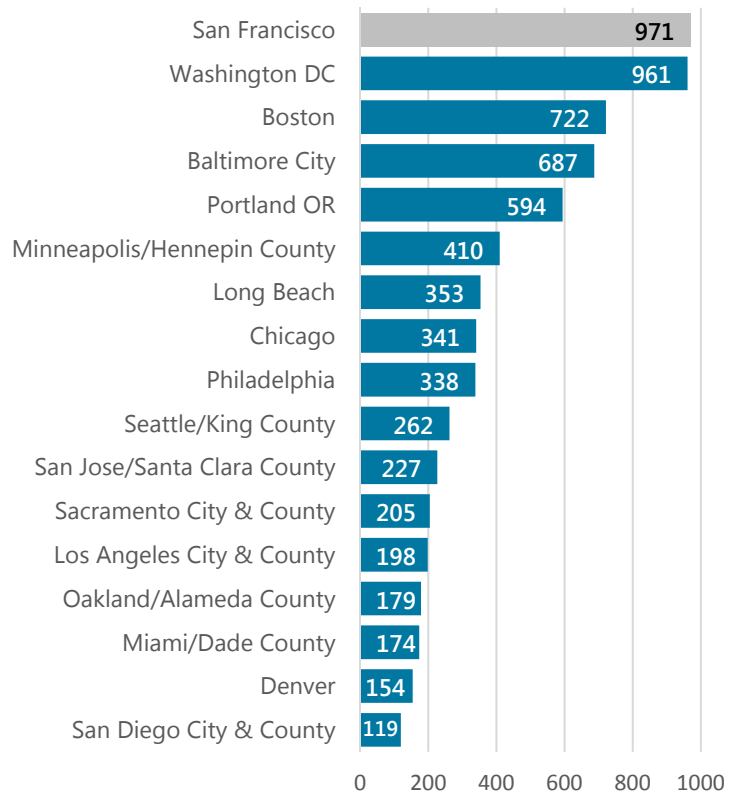
